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From Jason's Desk

It's July, summer is in full swing and we're starting to get back to life as we know it. We've got the 150th Lycoming County Fair along with a whole bunch of other local community events on this month's calendar. At this point of the year, we'd be deep into planning for Little League programs taking place here in the community with those being the Grand Slam Parade and Williamsport Welcomes the World. There would also be preparations for the Drum Corps World Championships along with our annual golf outing.

While everything is getting back to where we all want it, we're just not there yet. Unfortunately, because of the amount of planning that goes into events like the annual World Series and DCA Championships, we'll either be experiencing a little less of one with Little League, or a second year without Drum Corps. While there hasn't been much or any chatter about Drum Corps, there has been a good amount involving the decision by Little League Baseball on the World Series.

We work closely with Little League on a variety of things including the annual World Series. It was disappointing to hear from Steve Keener that they weren't going to be in a position to do the Series the way we have experienced it in 2019 and the many years before that. However, they were still planning to move forward with having a tournament with just US teams. The upside was yes, a Little

League World Series this year. The downside is that it was not going to be open to the public and the kids were going to be very limited in what they would do and participate in off Little League property.

So that big cheer when we heard there was going to be a World Series, was softened a little. Personally, as a baseball fan and enthusiast for the event, I was bummed that for a second year I wasn't going to have the opportunity to sit on the hill and catch a few games with my family. It also meant that the people we didn't see last year, and hoping to see this year, were going to be delayed until 2022.

From the work side of it, this meant that the businesses that were among the hardest hit, were not going to enjoy the bump that we were hoping to see with this year's Series. It also meant that we couldn't do a parade because let's be honest, how do you have a kick-off parade for the Little League World Series without the players.

This was announced the beginning of May. Just days later, the Governor would start truly re-opening Pennsylvania with a process that has fortunately led to the mask mandate being removed at the end of June and business for all intents is back to full capacity (if they can hire people).

Now the chatter running is "Why no fans?" and "Why not have the players out like before?" Now that we are fully able to congregate in large settings,

and yes, national sporting events are being held here in Pennsylvania at full capacity, people ask "Why not Little League?" I get the questions from people who don't have a clue about what goes into planning and organizing any event, let alone one on the scale of the World Series.

Let me address the "Why no fans" question first. The planning by Little League Baseball for the World Series would usually begin in earnest in late winter. Here we'll start getting questions from their staff around that time for things they need from us during the event. While they have staff, they also rely heavily on volunteers and outside organizations for assistance in pulling it off each year. This doesn't just include local organizations and public safety services, but one at the state and national level. That's just some of the reason for their early planning. Little League Baseball doesn't have the financial enterprise behind them like Major League Baseball or the National Football League does. Marshalling volunteers and the public agencies at this point is just not feasible. They also have to hire people to work there for the Series and given the challenges that summer event venues like Knoebel's, Hershey Park and basically any other business in our area has been having, who thinks they'd be any different in getting workers for an 11-day event.

Now, the issue with the players not getting out,

even including the parade. I get that they're young and even if they get it, the likelihood that they'd get sick enough to be in the hospital is remote. The challenge is that they are 11 and 12 year olds. Only 12 year olds and above are able to get vaccinated which creates a major problem for them. We won't get into the who will and won't get their kids or themselves vaccinated.

Beyond that, a perfect illustration just arose here in the past week. I love sports and watch and follow a number of them including the College Baseball World Series. For those that may not be aware, the semi-final series between Vanderbilt and North Carolina State, which is a 3-game set, ended up being forfeited after the first game because a large number of the NC State players were sick with Covid. Appreciating all that goes into any individual or team sport, that's not how you want to lose or advance.

Who wants to see some-

thing like that occur here? I sure don't and given that they will be housed together during their time here; I completely get why Little League is being as protective of these players as they are for this year.

Let's be thankful that we are able to have much of what we enjoyed prior to the pandemic. We're well on our way to putting this behind us. And with Little League, while we won't have it fully this year, next year we will be able to come together and celebrate like we did pre-pandemic. Even better, is that there will be more to celebrate in 2022 when not only will we be hosting the Little League Congress in June, which will bring about 1500 people from all over the world here, but next August will be the 75th Little League World Series. Definitely a lot to look forward to while we can still enjoy and appreciate what we currently do have for activities in our lives.

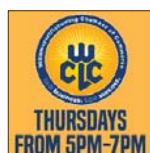

Henry's Bar-B-Q in 2nd generation ownership

LINDEN — Second generation, family owned barbeque joint, Henry's Bar-B-Q, located off of Route 220 in Linden, has their dining room open waiting for customers to come back and enjoy their "unique Carolina style" barbeque seven days a week from 10 a.m. to 9 p.m.

Dale Robinson Jr., owner, has run the business since purchasing it from his mother in 2008.

The business originally started in the late 1930's by John Henry and later passed down to other owners before it was bought by Robinson's family in 1966.

Today, Robinson even gets help from the business' third generation, his daughters who are in elementary and middle school.

His nine-year-old even helped him through the COVID-19 dining room closures.

"It was a challenging couple of months...the whole year and a half has been challenging," Robinson said.

Not only did the business have to deal with dining room closures but also the ongoing construction on the highway.

He even added that the business had not been a huge take out business before the closures, and still remains to sell take-out to many of his "loyal customers", but now things are "looking up".

Locals come in multiple days a week to veg out on their favorite sandwiches, "well-known" chili, coffees and desserts.

A local couple, Jim and Stella, came in during the interview to order their regular coffees and sandwiches.

Robinson added that the menu has expanded over the years, adding items such as pig wings, fried pig shanks, beer battered haddock, as well as sundaes, ice creams, pies and cookies.

"We buy local items," he added, say-
