From Jason's Desk

While April had its weather ups and downs, we were fortunate to have a few positive announcements on various fronts. We were pleased to see the official announcement of the Prysmian Group expansion project here in Williamsport at their plant in the Williamsport Industrial Park. The expansion project is already underway and should be complete by third quarter 2024.

We began working with the Prysmian Group's site consultant in late October 2022 on the project. At the time the consultant reached out to us, we only knew it as Project Edge and that it involved a manufacturer in Williamsport. We learned through discussions with them that it was a multi-national corporation that had two plants in other states that were competing for the project. The details shared was that it was a 51,000 square foot expansion with 27 new family sustaining jobs. Twenty of the positions would pay \$50,000 per employee and the remaining seven would pay over \$70,000. These were just wages and did not include benefits. It definitely was one that we wanted to land.

Outreach to the Governor's Action Team

was made shortly after we had the full detail to engage them. The state was pleased to see the level of investment in wages and came to the table with a solid offer. To complete the package, the City of Williamsport stepped forward with a local offer to assist with infrastructure needed at the site. We were pleased to learn that this effort paid off in getting the project here and happy to see it announced at the end of April.

It was good to also read the news about the agreement of sale with Lycoming County and Penn College to purchase the building for the coroner along with land the college owns in Brady Township near the Susquehanna River. This land will allow them to designate it for recreation purposes for future development while allowing property at White Deer Golf Course to be developed for housing, which is sorely needed in Lycoming County. We were pleased to help facilitate the early discussions by the County and College for the land acquisition to facilitate this future housing development.

More important though, of all the news, is that the County did the right thing in taking their time to make the right purchase of a building for the coroner. There was a push by some in the county to have the commissioners purchase an industrial building on Arch Street in Williamsport. This would have added another property in the City to the list of untaxable properties. It also would have taken away one of a few buildings in the county of that size for manufacturing. Had the County moved ahead last year to purchase the building for the coroner, the Chamber wouldn't have had it available this January for a Canadian based manufacturer who has now leased it to begin operations later this year.

This company came to us through the Office of International Business Development at the state and had a very clear set of parameters they needed for the site they were seeking. It was a plastics manufacturer that does rotational molding. They toured Penn College and was thoroughly impressed with their programming. They determined they wanted to be within a multi-county area of the College. After looking at properties here in Williamsport and in Centre County, they selected the Arch Street property. This company will begin by employing

The other key note on this building they are buying, is that it is already untaxed so there won't be another property going off the tax rolls.

Eder's means country charm, tradition, tasty ice cream

Eder's Ice Cream serves up not only tasty cold treats but a glimpse into yesteryear when life was much simpler.

That shouldn't come as a surprise given that the business has been passed down in the family through several generations.

Sheets, who along with his wife Ashley took over the business earlier this year, said.

Bruce Eder, Tye's great grandfather, started the business in 1927.

He wanted to serve milk and later ice cream and built a small shack next to the present site of Eder's erected in the 1930s.

Bruce ran the ice cream store until the 1970s and his daughter, Carmen took over.

"She ran it until 2017," Tye said.

That's when his uncle and aunt, Rob and Melissa Labatch, assumed control before it came under the ownership of Tye and Ashley.

Tye grew up in the business, sweeping cream is cookie dough. floors and serving up ice cream.

Owning and operating Eder's, he said, "is something I've always wanted to do."

according to Tye.

He estimated Eder's makes about 1,500 gallons of ice cream a week, about two times the amount the business churned out in 2007.

Located along Route 87 several miles north of Montoursville, Eder's draws customers from nearby and afar.

"We are at a scenic location," Tye said. "We like being away from town. You get that rural feel."

Many spring, summer, and fall days and evenings, particularly when the air is warm, can find cars, trucks, and motorcycles parked around the white rectangular building.

It's not uncommon, Tye said, for people who live out of the area to discover Eder's

and be smitten by its rustic charm.

"We have a following all over the United States now," he said.

In an age when so much of American business has gone the way of franchising and a cookie-cutter design and approach, Eder's is simply tradition and has never lost sight of its roots.

Inside the story are displayed vintage "I'm fourth generation Eder's," Tye machinery formerly used in the ice cream operation.

> "Our cooler was built by my great grandfather," Tye said proudly.

Patrons standing behind the long worn wooden counter waiting to be served can see photos of Bruce Eder and Carmen on the rear wall.

"There is history in this place," Tye said.

The recipes used were handed down through the family and everything is made on the premises.

Serving up homemade ice cream is what makes Eder's stand out.

Among the more popular flavors of ice

Eder's also serves up milk shakes, sundaes, and floats.

The shop stays open through the middle These days, the business is doing well, of December before reopening in March.
