What a great Little League World Series. Congratulations to Steve Keener and his entire team at Little League Baseball for hosting another wonderful tournament season this year. The games went pretty much uninterrupted by the weather, which always helps. And what a finish. Two excellent teams, both deserving and capable of winning. A grand slam to tie the ballgame in the top of the 5th and in the bottom of the 6th, a home run to win the game. Exciting for all to see and experience and I'm already looking forward to what 2024 and the 77th Little League World Series will bring to us.

Taking a look at what else was happening in August, in the City, council is set to act on whether to accept the bid to sell the current city hall building. In looking at the situation, I think back to the first house that my wife and I bought. It was a small 1500 square foot house with 3 bedrooms in the east of Williamsport. The house was older, dating back to 1929. We qualified for a first time home buyers loan and that was at 6.5% interest at the time. It was a great neighborhood with a mix of empty nesters and young families.

Being a first time homeowner in an older home brought many lessons. The first was that there was always something to be fixing. whether it was the furnace, water heater, leaky roof, etc. Some of the things I was able to do myself, while others were left to the experts. There were many lessons learned along the way in doing fixes and repairs like realizing I should have just called someone who knew what they were doing instead of me doing it myself. I'll never forget me trying to fix the front door knob, which I thought was going to be an easy fix. It ended up being an introduction to a mortis lock, which I completely destroyed and had my wife in tears realizing that I wasn't the capable handyman that my father was in fixing items at the house. That not only taught me something new

about what a mortis lock was, it also gave me a lesson that I didn't know everything about owning an older house.

So you are probably wondering where I'm going with all of this and how it relates to the current situation with Williamsport's city hall. Well first, the current members of city hall have inherited this issue with the building. The issues with a leaky roof, poor heating and ventilation and the host of other items have culminated into what they are now dealt.

These issues arose because of lack of care and investment when the little items came up that needed to be fixed, but were put off for other reasons. This is not to blame previous administrations or councils because there's only so much money available and choices need to be made about what is best done with it. I don't believe there was any ill intent by any previous official at the city to see the building be in its current state.

Old buildings and old homes take regular care and upkeep. Unfortunately this wasn't done with the current city hall. Numbers have been put out there ranging from \$5 million upwards to \$20 million. Whatever that number is, if routine maintenance would have been done, it wouldn't have cost that much in regular upkeep.

Now council must decide if it's better to put this into the hands of the private sector to own, fix and maintain the building or for the city to undertake this repair. Based upon how we've got here, I personally believe that this building is better off in the hands of the private sector. Examples here in the city abound to support this position. The former Herdic House Hotel (now Park Place), former West Branch Bank (current Chamber and Visitors Center home), the Home for the Friendless (presently The Stacks) and former City Hall (now City Hall Grand Hotel) are just four examples of what the private sector has done in reusing older buildings in the City.

know that this was the former post office which was deeded over through sale to the city back in the 70s. Much has changed in the city since that time with two of the biggest being the population has declined from where it was in 1970 from 38,000 to roughly 26,000 and the various technology advances. The amount of city personnel required has dropped over those years to where now it has been stated that the city administration requires offices for approximately 30 personnel.

Whatever the decision that city council makes regarding the future ownership of this building, I know that they do this with great thought and consideration in what they believe is the best for the city. Knowing this, I look forward to the point in the next year or two when this building has people in it, for whatever purpose that is ultimately decided.

Looking at the header, you might wonder what is a site consultant FAM tour. Well first off, FAM is short for familiarization and a site consultant is what businesses and corporation use in helping to identify communities for future locations for plants and back office operations.

We've been partnering with the state's Department of Community and Economic Development team since 2017 in annually hosting a site consultant FAM tour during the Little League World Series. The Series is the carrot we use in getting site consultants to come to Pennsylvania to learn about business development programming along with getting a firsthand look at what is available here in Lycoming County in terms of workforce, land, buildings and quality of life amenities.

This year we received funding from the Lycoming Economic Development Joseph L. Rider fund at the First Community Foundation Partnership to help cover the costs in hosting this tour. In addition to seeing World Series games, we also were able to tour them through Ralph S. Alberts, Lycoming Engines, Penn College and UPMC Williamsport. We appreciate their support in being able to showcase the various capabilities found here in our market.
