Kitchen Repose keeps hungry consumers happy, healthy

It's local election season and while there aren't many contested races to note, this year we will be guaranteed at least two new Lycoming County Commissioners. Both Tony Mussare and Rick Mirabito announced earlier this year that they would not seek another term. With that, county voters will see three new names (Denitra Moffett, Marc Sortman and Mark Mussina) along with current commissioner Scott Metzger on the ballot.

Earlier this month, I got an opportunity to moderate the Eagle Grange #1 County Commissioner candidates' forum. It's safe for me to say that many of you reading this weren't in attendance as there were less than 30 people at it. You missed a great opportunity to hear from the candidates and speak to them afterwards.

To me, it was my opportunity to learn more about each of these individuals who will possibly be leading our county government for the next four years. Hearing their responses to the questions posed gave me comfort in the fact that Lycoming County should be in capable hands no matter the composition of the next Board of Commissioners following next Tuesday.

These forums are very helpful to me because they provide insights to how they view items that you don't read on a website or leaflet. They also give you the chance to speak to them following the forum to address specific items important to you personally. While I know three of the candidates, two of them are through work. Denitra was new to me as I only got a chance to briefly meet her following a commissioners meeting earlier in the year.

Each candidate brings different life experiences to the table. Their focus as to priorities for the position reflected that difference. Mark Mussina who is a partner in a local media company, shared he has already met with various staff and row office officials. He sees communication amongst those at the county as a key element to getting work accomplished. Marc Sortman spoke to his experience as a local township supervisor. He sees taxes and keeping them at a proper rate will help attract new businesses to the area and afford existing ones the opportunity to expand. Denitra Moffett has a military background in service to our country. She's also the only candidate that didn't grow up here. Her focus is to grow the area with younger families and work to find ways to address the lack of childcare here in the county. Scott Metzger spoke to his work currently and what he intends to continue to work on should he be re-elected. He addressed both the airport and the lack of commercial air service along with getting the levee system recertified as his priorities.

Beyond their responses, I noted how they interacted with one another. They were respectful and complimentary at times to their opponents. There wasn't the bitterness we see for other elected offices at the state and federal level. It should go without me saying this, but I trust that you will be out there Tuesday casting your ballot.

One other item that I wanted to address this month is the work of our local state delegation. You might have caught that we did a breakfast here the other week with Senator Yaw and Representatives Hamm and Flick. An item that was mentioned which was rather concerning to me was a bill going through the House, House Bill 170. This bill is focused on the natural gas industry and among the various items it contains, would expand setbacks from the current 2,500 to 5,000. House Bill 170 would have detrimental impacts to the natural gas industry and see many of the producers move out of the commonwealth. While there is a desire among some to see this happen, we here locally cannot afford to see this occur. It was helpful to hear that all three of our state legislators will be battling against this effort to drive out the natural gas industry.






