## Central Contracting

**From Jason Fink's Desk - President/CEO of the Williamsport/Lycoming Chamber of Commerce**

What a great start to June. Hopefully, this is what we will be experiencing for the rest of the summer. We had some rather cold days last month and I'm hopeful that our ag partners in the county won't see much impact from it. From what I've been reading, there's a strong chance that our stone fruits will be the most affected by it. I remember last year the cherries in the area were hit, so I'm hopeful that's not the case again this year.

With the nice weather, it was good to be out at the end of last month with DCNR Secretary Cindy Adams Dunn and Fish and Boat Commission Executive Director Tim Schaeffer up Pine Creek. They were in the county to highlight a new accessible fishing platform in the Tiadaghton State Forest that ensures visitors of all ability levels can fish on the Pine Creek.

The fishing platform at the Tomb Flats Campground provides more than 100 linear feet of flat, accessible fishing access to the Pine Creek. Other improvements they made through the project included an extension at the existing concrete boat launch, paved accessible parking spaces, and a native meadow, trees, riparian buffer plantings, and climate mitigation measures.

It was great to see the partnerships that were involved with making this happen. To provide more insight on those partnerships, Renee Carey from the Northcentral Pennsylvania Conservancy and George Durrwachter spoke about their acquisition of the Tomb Flats property.

It was interesting to learn how George was able to facilitate the sale of the land to the Conservancy and the challenges the Conservancy ran into as they closed on the property. The other item that I learned was that the property had a quarry on the east side of 414.

There were other representatives in attendance that spoke of the importance of this for those with mobility challenges. A gentleman with a local veterans group drove this message home speaking about how this will allow disabled vets the opportunity to safely get back out to be on the water enjoying time fishing.

While we were there, three fishermen were in the stream fly fishing. They were joined by various birds who were competing with the fish for the latest hatches that had begun earlier in the week along the creek.

Just a couple side notes about the Pine Creek. The Pine Creek Rail Trail is being recognized this year as the "Trail of the Year" in Pennsylvania. The trail attracts more than 44,000 users annually and generates more than \$5 million in local economic impact. One other note here is a reminder to us all that we are fortunate to have Pine Creek running through the western end of the county because if you are ever on Jeopardy and the clue is "The largest creek in the U.S.", you can confidently say "What is the Pine Creek".

Moving into the City, we received official word last month that the Main Street Matters grant that we helped serve as a conduit for Matt Schauer to advance a project in the 600 block of Pine Street was approved for \$750,000 in funding.

The project takes properties in the section of the City and revamps them through a comprehensive construction project. It will involve the renovation and rebuilding of an existing three story structure in that block. Plans will also include the renovation and rebuild of a multi-story barn structure for use as a micro brewery. It will also renovate and rebuild another structure in the block to provide 4,000 square feet of mixed-use occupancy. There will also be the creation of a community garden space connecting the properties.

There are many good things coming our way in Lycoming County. Get out and enjoy this great weather and appreciate not only what we have now, but those new improvements and additions coming our way in the next couple years.

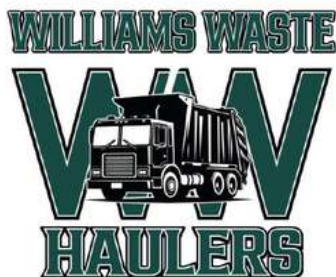

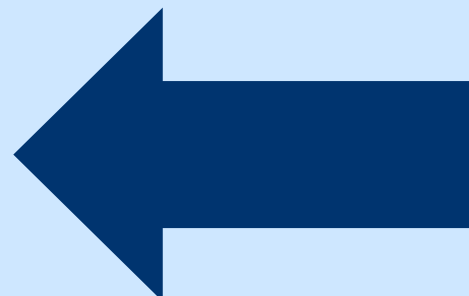

# Junior League of Williamsport promotes service

The Junior League of Williamsport is a non-profit organization dedicated to promoting community service, while empowering women in their personal and professional endeavors.

The Williamsport branch was founded in 1929, and has been a member of the worldwide Association of Junior Leagues International Incorporated (AJLI) since its inception.

The organization is dedicated to creating positive and lasting change in the greater Williamsport and Lycoming County area by focusing on social activism that directly benefits the community, most-recent past President and nine-year member Melissa Kelley explained, adding that the organization's purpose is exclusively educational and charitable.

"We're looking to empower women of all ages to become leaders by providing meaningful leadership opportunities and the tools to put those skills to work within any aspect of their lives," she said.

A Williamsport native and graduate, Kelley became involved with the organization after moving back to the area following the completion of her master's degree.

"I wanted to get involved in community service again because community involvement and service were always something super important to me throughout my upbringing," she said.

"When we support those in need, it helps us strengthen our community. It fosters compassion, teamwork, a sense of responsibility and building strong leaders also helps to guide others, because you never know what kind of impact you're going to make on somebody

else," Kelley said.

As a youth, Kelley received her Girl Scout Gold Award, and was involved with various organizations throughout her high school years, including Key Club.

While attending Penn State, she was heavily involved with Thon, the largest student-run philanthropy that raises money for kids with pediatric cancer, including a stint as chair.

During her senior year, she was captain for Donor and Alumni Relations, helping to oversee fundraising efforts of all student-run organizations.

The league offers leadership and community service opportunities to women 21 and above.

"We've had people come in and do leadership trainings with us from outside organizations, and we

try to send members to local conferences, like the Women's Empowerment Conference through the YWCA, and others," Kelley said.

"The Junior League as a whole, also has different types of leadership training conferences throughout the year, and through our fundraising efforts, we try to send members to some of those," she added.

"Within our organization, we have our board, our president, president-elect, treasurer, secretary and community VP, and then we also have a sustaining advisor that's someone who has been in the league for a very long time, maybe was involved in past leadership and helps to answer any questions and guide our board," Kelley said, adding that various committees

carry out duties from fundraising to membership and community engagement.

"We always encourage members to step into leadership positions even if they haven't had any experience before because we are a training organization, and how else are you going to learn and step outside your comfort zone," she said.

In terms of community service, the organization has three focus areas: food security, mental health and wellness and literacy.

One of their most prevalent initiatives is Code Red Period, started in fall 2024, which works to provide feminine hygiene products to 16 schools throughout the county.

The organization recently wrapped up its Period Poverty Awareness Week, which saw the participation of many local busi-

nesses, acting as drop-off locations.

"We also have an Amazon wish list that people can also donate through," Kelley said.

"In terms of food security, we have Kids in the Kitchen, which we do through Firetree Place, and it teaches local kids how to cook easy meals for themselves and their families," she added.

"Our third initiative that was started in the spring of 2025 is our Baby's First Book," Kelley explained.

"We partnered with Otto's Bookstore and UPMC, with the goal of promoting and encouraging reading from birth, family bonding and the importance of those early pre-literacy skills," she said.

Through that partnership, the bag that goes home with new parents includes a book for the baby, along with a Spanish-language book and literacy information for parents on reading to children and ways to promote literacy.

Other community organizations the league has partnered with include Kids First Friday, Red Shield Community Garden, YWCA Boutique, Thrive International Programs and local food banks to name a few.

Kelley stressed that the organization is always looking for new recruits willing to step out of their comfort zone and try new opportunities.

"Even the smallest contributions of time and effort can make a meaningful difference, and we really embrace teamwork, collaboration, and new ideas, because there is a lot of cross communication amongst our board and our various committees in order to work on all of our initiatives," she stressed.

"Sometimes we have people come into our league who might be more shy or timid, but we encourage them to take advantage of leadership and training opportunities

# Faddies Ice Cream & Pizza focuses on customers, community

The COVID-19 pandemic brought about the closure of many businesses, but for one Montoursville business, it served as an opportunity for transformation.

“My wife used to have Tanya’s Bridal Shop here, but when the pandemic hit, that kind of wiped that out,” said Jay Rice, owner of Faddies Ice Cream & Pizza, 348 Broad St, Montoursville.

“Our number one dress seller that we had for 25 years closed and when that happened, the writing was on the wall, and we figured we didn’t want to start all over again,” Rice explained.

“And that’s when Faddies really came alive,” he added.

The space had also been home to Dance Plus, with Faddies, then known as Tanya’s Ice Cream, situated in a horseshoe-shaped area in the back of the building.

The ice cream side of the business came about after another local ice cream shop closed up, leaving a void Rice was happy to fill, though his origins within the industry go back much further.

“When I was younger, I used to carry ice cream for the Little League World Series, and that’s how I made my money in the summer,” he explained.

“I always said I was going to open an ice cream shop one day, and we started out very small, but as the years came along, it grew and grew,” Rice said.

Today, Faddies is instantly recognizable by its vibrant blue and green colors and

penguin mascot, and offers 55 flavors of hard serve and 24 varieties of soft serve flavors from a variety of suppliers, including Sunset Ice Cream.

“We can make over 100 different milkshakes. Anything you want, if you come through the door and just ask for it, we can make it. My wife makes freak shakes, which are a popular thing, and she would do them for movies coming out and things like that,” Rice said.

“I can get any kind of flavor, any kind of treat, you name it,” he said, adding that the shop also carries Italian ice, Dippin’ Dots and much more.

“I go to expos and seminars because I want to stay on top of everything for the ice cream side,” he said.

Even with such a variety of flavors, Rice said his biggest sellers remain what

he considers to be “comfort food,” including anything peanut butter, along with cookies and cream and salted caramel truffle.

“We have a lot of people that have a go-to because they’re used to it, and I just tell them, ‘come back 55 times and try every flavor, and find what you like,’” Rice said.

While famous for their ice cream, Faddies is equally known for their pizza, which came about after Jay attended an expo where pizza was being made.

“It’s a top seller for me, and our pizza is really good,” Rice said, stressing that that assessment is not only his own, but that of his customers.

“We make our own dough, our own sauce, and everything is made right here in house,” he said.

Faddies offers a variety of

pizza options, ranging from traditional cheese and pepperoni to Buffalo Chicken, Dill Pickle, Cheddar Bacon and more.

While they don’t serve by-the-slice portions at the shop until summertime, Rice said an excellent place to try out the different options without the commitment of a full pizza is at their food truck.

Although primarily known for pizza and ice cream, Faddies boasts an expansive menu, including French fries, cauliflower-based items, garlic knots, strombolis, subs, sandwiches, acai bowls and much more.

“Another good one is our chopped sub because everything gets put chopped up together, so every time you bite into it, you taste everything,” Rice said, adding that new additions to the menu are always in the

works.

“When I try new stuff, it goes through me, my wife, all my kids, my friends, and family. And I have customer friends that I’ll say, ‘here, try this out,’ and they give me their honest opinion,” he said.

“That’s the way we proceeded with a lot of our stuff, because the simple fact is, I want to be able to serve a good product at a reasonable price and maintain a very good customer base,” said Rice, who also aims for a family-friendly environment.

“We have two pool tables, we have skee-ball, air hockey, a basketball hoop, and then we have a couple pinball machines, so when people come in here, they can come and get their ice cream, they can sit down, and the adults talk and the kids play,” he said, adding that the pool tables have been a welcomed addition following the demise of Monoski’s Billiards.

“And the parents love it too. They’re big kids. I have an older gentleman, probably in his early 80’s, and he rides the motorcycle,” Rice added.

“It’s knee high to a grasshopper up to 90 years old,” he said.

Future plans include the addition of more pool tables with an eye towards hosting tournaments for the kids.

Rice also stressed that while he focuses on customer satisfaction, the greater community is always in the back of his mind.

“We just did a teacher appreciation day, where we offered 25 pizzas to whatever school got the most votes on our Facebook page,” he explained, with Donald E.

Schick Elementary taking home the top prize.

Faddies is also involved with wrestling, Pop Warner and Friday night football games at Loyalsock Township and wrestling at South Williamsport and Montoursville.

“I make pizzas for them, and I sell them to them at a cheap price, so their concession stands make more money,” Rice explained.

Additionally, Rice sponsors little league teams of Montoursville, South Williamsport and Williamsport.

Asked what has helped Faddies to continue to stand out in a sea of eateries, Rice said listening to his customers and providing consistency has been key.

“That’s what really made Faddies - the customers. If it wasn’t for all the customers, Faddies wouldn’t be here,” he said, adding that when he and his wife retires, the business will live on through his family.

“I’m teaching them everything that I do, so there won’t be any drop in quality. When I go on vacation, people don’t even know I’m not here. Consistency is there for everything,” he said.

“I always just tell people to give us a try, and let us know what you think,” Rice said.

“Once I get you to try us, especially the pizza, you’re gonna want it from that point forward. I guarantee it. There’s no question about that,” he said, adding that he doesn’t do heavy advertising, as he prefers word of mouth to get the job done.

“We like our customers to be our fireworks,” he said.

to help step outside their comfort zone and learn new skills. Understanding our mission of service and community impact is truly what makes the experience so rewarding," she said.

Kelley said what makes the Junior League of Williamsport so important is the impact their initiatives have right in their local communities.

"It's bringing women together from very diverse backgrounds who are making a positive impact, and helping develop women's leadership skills through hands-on training,

work, committees and community involvement," she said.

"We're also supporting local nonprofits, organizations and initiatives through our partnerships, even through our fundraising and our volunteer efforts, it creates opportunities for us to grow personally and professionally, while also giving back to others," Kelley added, adding that the strong sense of connection among members often creates lasting friendships.

"It also encourages a culture of service, compassion and leadership throughout the greater Williamsport area. A lot of us are

young women who have children, so it sets a positive example for them. Sometimes people will bring their kids to some of the community service things, and that's empowering the youth as well," she added.

As part of that empowerment effort, Kelley said the league is working to integrate an initiative by the AJLI known as Every Woman. All Things. in a club-style format into local schools.

In 2026, the league began offering a scholarship opportunity at Williamsport High School.

"It's an amount of money that will go

to a female college-bound senior who encompasses our values of community service leadership and what the Junior League is all about," Kelley explained.

With the Junior League's 97th year coming to a close, preparations are underway for some type of celebration and community acknowledgement of their upcoming 100th anniversary, Kelley said.

## Central Contracting provides employers with right personnel

A Lock Haven business links other professionals to provide employers with the right personnel to complete projects.

Central Contracting, 87 Allison St., in this Clinton County hub of business, specializes in partnering with other contractors to provide manpower so they can complete their jobs on time and on budget.

"Our crews offer general jobsite labor to specialized skilled labor," said Jordan Sheffer, Central Contracting spokesman.

"We have been in operation since 2005," he said of a 21-year legacy of serving the community.

Asked what he likes best about being at the company, Sheffer replied: "I enjoy being able to hear our customers' needs and schedule the best match(es) from our team."

Admittedly, he said, this business wasn't always what it is today.

In 2005, Sheffer said he and a long-time friend were going to Lock Haven University and both had trucks.

"We got a lawn mower and some basic landscaping equipment and put an ad in the Lock Haven Express," he said.

"Within a year we were so busy that we hired a few of our friends," he said, adding, "then opportunities presented themselves to do larger jobs.

"My partner and I had a friendly split, and I started taking on any job I could get," Sheffer said.

In the fall of 2006, Sheffer said he was deployed for a year in Iraq with the US Army Reserves.

"So, that certainly put a hold on the business," he said. Upon his return, Sheffer said he had a built a little savings and was able to start doing other businesses as well.

Central Contracting started to evolve from a landscape company to a manpower service provider, he added.

"Today, that is about 80% of our yearly revenue," he said. "At peak, we employ over 30 full time and several part time,

hard-working men and women."

While Central Contracting primarily serves central Pennsylvania, it has sent employees to jobsites as far as Texas.

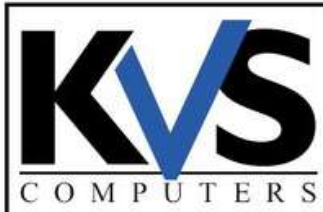

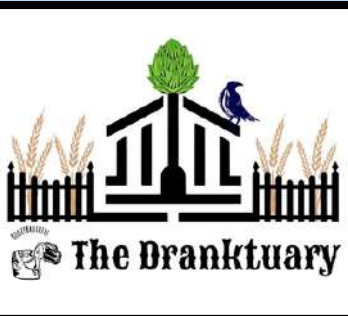
